RE: OFM Memo – Direction to Agencies on 2025-27 Budget Reduction Proposals

Dear Director Chapman-See,

The University of Washington understands the considerable magnitude of the operating budget deficit and appreciates your efforts to work with agencies to responsibly steward state resources. Our University is fully-enrolled with unprecedented demand, and any state funding reduction would impact our ability to provide affordable and accessible education for Washington's students and our state's workforce development needs. Focusing spending reductions in public education specifically on baccalaureate institutions in the Governor's budget proposal is disappointing and would diminish our ability to meet workforce demands and provide opportunities for Washingtonians in the coming years, especially given the recent "Skill Up for Our Future" report from the WA Roundtable.

Historically, cuts to our public higher education institutions have been offset in part or whole by legislative authorization for tuition increases. We do not have the same flexibility that we had during previous cuts: the state limits the annual increase to resident undergraduate tuition, many of our non-resident and graduate and professional program rates are above peer prices, and significant enrollment increases are not feasible given space availability at the UW and a competitive landscape for student enrollment with national and statewide declines in enrollment. In addition, the state already requires that our institutions use incremental tuition revenue to support salary increases.

The University is proactively taking steps to mitigate risks to our mission in light of expense growth and significant state and federal uncertainty through our <u>Together We Thrive</u> program. Units have been asked to review hiring plans; restrict non-essential spending including travel, training, and supplies; review and renegotiate contracts; and constrain

non-core activities that do not directly support instruction, research, and public service. However, these efforts are unlikely to accomplish a significant reduction to state-funded activity given that state funding is primarily directed to our academic mission. If a state funding reduction is implemented, the University would explore the following options:

- Reducing the number of resident undergraduate (RUG) student enrollment slots at our Seattle campus, which would be offset by additional non-resident undergraduate (NRUG) enrollments. State support per FTE has declined by 23 percent since FY08, and the University's enrollment mix must reflect state support. Due to the higher NRUG tuition rate, a 2% reduction to RUG FTE enrollment (560 students) and commensurate increase to NRUG enrollment would generate approximately enough incremental revenue to offset a 3% state funding reduction.
- Reducing student financial aid: the University currently provides need-based aid and waivers to low-income resident students beyond legislative requirements. Reducing institutional aid would impact our Washington resident students, but it would result in increased net tuition revenue for academic operations that could offset a portion of a funding reduction.

We understand it is possible the state could assess across-the-board funding reductions and authorize new salary increases for state employees in FY26 and FY27. To be clear, we would have to consider any new salary funding to offset a cut in appropriations. The totality of state funding provided will be used to determine whether the University is able to implement state authorizations for salary increases. Incremental state funding for salary increases for faculty and staff has been roughly equivalent to the magnitude of a 3% funding reduction, meaning the state would be providing little to no additional support for authorized state employees raises and collective bargaining agreements. This approach would further exacerbate Great Recession-era funding models, despite state-mandated caps on tuition growth.

Finally, if targeted reductions are needed, we recommend a review of one-time funding for programs that are not related to an official request of the University or fundamental to our academic, student support, and research missions in service to the state. We also request maximum flexibility in managing any reductions that might be necessary.

We urge our state leaders to implement creative approaches to minimize or avoid state budget cuts to our public higher education institutions. We are still recovering from Great Recession-era cuts and the COVID-19 pandemic, while experiencing extraordinary inflationary costs and student demand for high-cost majors, all as we strive to provide highquality and affordable education to Washington's students.

Dear Director Chapman-See,

In addition to the letter from University of Washington (UW) President Ana Mari Cauce last week, we have been asked to provide a listing of current state budget provisos for the UW that were not tied to an official UW budget request to the state.

Attached is a list of UW provisos that were not tied to a decision package submitted by the University. Many of these items, however, were developed by members of the legislature in collaboration with UW faculty and staff. We have excluded items that are tied to legislation, since removing proviso funding would also require the repeal of associated state laws to achieve savings.

In addition, we have included a list of provisos that were provided in the 2023-25 and 2024 supplemental budgets as one-time funding, which are set to expire. These items total nearly \$198 million, an approximate 14% reduction to the current state budget allocation to the UW.
